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Boozman Bulletin: Leading Efforts to Provide Flexibility to Summer Meal Programs

For children, summertime brings a euphoric feeling of freedom. For a few months, it means no more early classes, pop quizzes or homework. But for too many children in Arkansas, it raises levels of anxiety instead of euphoria because they no longer have a reliable prospect to eat a meal at breakfast or lunchtime.

More than 300,000 Arkansas students rely on free or reduced-price breakfast or lunch served during the school year. Many of those students lose access to the same nutritious meals when school is out. The U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) was created to fill in that gap during the summer months.

The SFSP offers children from low-income families free lunch and snacks in the summer. While it works well in some communities, too many children still go hungry during the summer. This is evidenced by the fact that summer meals currently reach less than 20 percent of children who participate in similar programs during the school year.

I've seen the need to update these programs. That's why Senator Pat Leahy (D-VT) and I are leading a bipartisan charge to overcome this challenge and make federal child nutrition programs more efficient, flexible and better equipped to reach children in need. Our bill, the *Hunger-Free Summer for Kids Act of 2019*, brings colleagues from different regions, with views across the political spectrum, together to address the issue, and it counts Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell (R-KY) as one of its cosponsors. We teamed up because we have seen the need for more options to end hunger in our communities and share a belief that the best solutions to this problem come from the ground up.

Arkansas River Flood Recovery: How to Apply for Federal Disaster Assistance

Federal resources are available to Arkansans impacted by the devastating Arkansas River flooding. Residents of Arkansas, Conway, Crawford, Desha, Faulkner, Jefferson, Logan, Perry, Pope, Pulaski, Sebastian and Yell counties are eligible to apply for individual assistance that may include money to help pay for temporary housing, emergency home repairs or other disaster-related expenses.

To apply for federal disaster assistance:

- Call 800-621-3362 from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. daily. For TTY call 800-462-7585. Those who
 use 711 or Video Relay Service (VRS) can call 800-621-3362.

- FEMA established Disaster Recovery Centers around the state. Arkansans can register with FEMA at the following locations Monday Saturday 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Sunday 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

- "Key" to Unlocking the Veteran Suicide Crisis: Department of Veterans Affairs (VA)
 Secretary Robert Wilkie called my legislation to create a VA grant program to leverage
 veteran-serving non-profits and other community networks in order to reduce veteran
 suicide "key" to unlocking the crisis. The IMPROVE Wellbeing for Veterans Act creates
 a new grant program to enable the VA to improve coordination of veteran mental health
 and suicide prevention services and to better measure the effectiveness of these
 programs in order to reduce the alarming number of veteran suicides.
- Franklin County Job Corps Center to Remain Open: I was pleased to learn that the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) will continue to maintain the important job training resources at the Cass Job Corps Civilian Conservation Center. Last month, the department announced that it would close the location. I fought to keep this center open as the lead Republican on the Job Corps Protection Act.
- Rural Broadband Expansion: The Federal Communications Commission is investing \$22 million in Arkansas to expand rural broadband. Baxter, Fulton, Izard, Marion, Sharp and Stone Counties will receive support for broadband deployment. As a cochair of the Senate Broadband Caucus, I will continue to promote and advance policies that strengthen internet service in rural Arkansas.
